

On September 23-25, 2024, Dr. Angela Thomas had the opportunity to attend the CTE Leadership Collaborative Convening (CTE LC) sponsored by the Educational Credit Management Corporation Foundation (ECMCF). The ECMC Foundation is a national foundation whose North Star goal is to eliminate equity gaps in postsecondary completion by 2040. Their mission is to improve higher education for career success among underserved populations through evidence-based innovation. Combining their North Star goal with their mission support their vision, "All learners unlock their fullest potential." 
Prepping for Spring
