

The Central Sterile Processing course will cover a comprehensive curriculum designed to prepare students for a successful career in sterile processing. Topics will include infection control, sterilization techniques, surgical instrumentation, and quality assurance. Students will gain hands-on experience and practical knowledge that will be invaluable in their professional journey.

Certification and Career Opportunities

Upon completing the course, graduates will be eligible to take the Sterile Processing and Distribution (SPD) Technician Certification Exam, earning the respected title of Central Sterile Processing and Distribution Technician (CSPDT). Furthermore, with 400 hours of post-course practical experience, graduates will qualify to sit for the Healthcare Sterile Processing Association's Certified Registered Central Service Technician (CRCST) exam. Our dedicated course instructor will guide students interested in planning for the CRCST exam.

Graduates can look forward to rewarding careers in various settings, including surgery centers, central sterile processing departments in hospitals, and traveling consultation services

For years, our local professional association, the North Carolina Society of Radiologic Technologists, has fought for legislation to change this. Tuesday April 15th was designated as Advocacy Day, a day where NCSRT members and radiologic technologists went to Raleigh to meet with representatives to gain support for a bill requiring licensure.
